## 5-Year Cohort Graduation Rates Over Time

$73.5 \%$ of students who started as freshmen in the 2011-2012 school year graduated within 5 years, a record high for CPS. This equates to 20,438 students earning a diploma.

## Freshmen On Track Rates over Time

87.4\% of CPS freshmen were on-track to graduate in the 2015-2016 school year. Being on-track in the freshman year is highly predictive of a student's chance of graduating.

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## Early College and Career Credentials

Over 40\% of CPS students graduate with more than just a high school diploma. These credentials give students a head-start on college and careers.


## ACT Performance

Students achieved a record-high average ACT score of 18.4, an increase of over 2 points since 2001. Over $30 \%$ of students scored 21 or higher on the ACT in 2016.

Since 2001, the number of students taking the test has increased from approximately 15,000 students to approximately 23,000.

## District Performance on NWEA MAP Over Time

Attainment: The \% of students at/above grade-level attainment norms is steadily increasing in both reading and math.

Growth: The \% of students meeting and exceeding national average growth norms has remained above average for the third straight year, increasing from last year.

In 2015, CPS $4^{\text {th }}$ graders showed the third highest increase for students in large, urban districts, and CPS $8^{\text {th }}$ graders showed the largest increase in math among large, urban districts.


## Achievement Gaps

Despite progress across all demographic groups, achievement gaps still remain in many key areas.

For example, graduation rates differ by race and gender. One in five African-American male students does not graduate.

On NWEA, diverse learners, English Learners, and low-income students perform below their peers in reading and math.

## Suspensions and Expulsions

The rate of out-of-school suspensions has fallen by $67 \%$ and the number of expulsions has dropped by $82 \%$ over the last 4 years as schools have transitioned to using preventative approaches such as social and emotional learning and restorative justice practices.


## My Voice, My School (5Essentials) Over Time

Over half of schools have been identified as "Well Organized" and $75 \%$ are in the top two categories.
