Key Updates



Building a Safe, Supportive District Culture: OSP Trainings for District-Wide Staff in SY19-20

District-wide trainings completed by over 43,000 CPS employees this year:

- Protecting Chicago Children's Training (67 min.) Overview of Title IX, CPS Sexual Misconduct Categories, Consent, Related District Policies and Guidelines, Reporting Procedures, Investigations, and Creating a Culture of Consent.
 - Each attendee received the Comprehensive Non-Discrimination, Harassment, and Retaliation Policy, the Reporting of Child Abuse Policy, Staff/Student Acceptable Use Policies, and the Guidelines for Maintaining Professional Staff/Student Boundaries.
- IL Mandated Reporter Training (60 min.) Overview how mandated reporters can protect children by recognizing and reporting child abuse.
- Sexual Harassment Training (35 min.) Overview of related policies and procedures, including legal obligations, key definitions, and reporting and investigative procedures.





Building a Safe, Supportive District Culture: OSP Trainings for Title IX School Representatives

100% of District and Charter Schools have trained Title IX School Reps. that completed a 3.5 hour in-person training on how to lead the on-the-ground coordination of responding to sexual misconduct concerns at their schools. The training covers many related topics, but focuses on the following interactive activities for hands-on-learning:

- Defining CPS Sexual Misconduct Categories: Small groups explore the differences of how attendees versus students define the Sexual Misconduct categories.
- Sequencing of Steps for Reporting: Small groups work to identify the appropriate sequence for steps to reporting either adult or student sexual misconduct.
- Appropriately Responding to a Student Allegation: Small groups discuss how to appropriately respond to disclosures and students, both complaints and respondents.
- Who You Gonna Call?: Large group activity where staff review case scenarios and identify the appropriate authorities to contact: OSP, OIG, DCFS, or Other.



Building a Safe, Supportive District Culture: OSP Trainings for Specialized Staff Groups in SY19-20

OSP conducted over 100 trainings for various audiences since beginning in 2018. Below, is a summary of key trainings conducted for specific staff groups this school year covering Title IX, OSP Sexual Misconduct Categories, OSP Reporting Procedures, and Related CPS Policies and Guidelines:

- Over 1,110 CPS and Charter School Administrators, Including Principals, APs, & Other School Leaders Trained at the CPS Legal Conference (50 min.)
- Trained 100% of CPS Security Managers to Train 1400 Security Officers (3.5 hrs.)
- Trained 60+ CPS Athletic Directors on Sexual Misconduct & Sports Equity (1 hr.)
- Trained 130+ Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) from 46 Schools (1 hr.)
- Trained Team of Parent Support Administrators (1 hr.)





Building a Safe, Supportive District Culture: OSP Trainings for Specific School Communities in SY19-20

OSP began implementing increased school-specific training sessions in response to requests or specific incidents this school year.

- Benefit of School-Specific Training increase in call volume from schools immediately following their training sessions.
 - The OSP data team has begun analyzing the impact of school-based trainings on reporting from schools.
- Providing Custom Formats for School Trainings OSP responds to schools' request for specialized information through a variety of formats, including:
 - Providing multiple sessions during the school day to cycle through all staff.
 - Providing large staff sessions for schools focused on their needs and concerns.





Building a Safe, Supportive District Culture: New Resources for Students, Families, and Staff

OSP responds to specific school communities with high needs in several ways:

- New OSP Hotline Number (773-535-8523) In addition to our general main line open to all, this new hotline number will allow students and parents, from schools with a high number of OSP-related cases, to request assistance or make additional reports, without having to re-explain the other school incidents, due to a dedicated staff member answering all the calls.
- New OSP Student/Parent Support Email Account (<u>OSPSupport@cps.edu</u>) Established a new email account for students/parents from schools with a high
 number of OSP-related cases to request supports directly to OSP via e-mail.
- New OSP Online Complaint Report Form (<u>www.cps.edu/osp</u>) Established a
 new reporting form that any staff member, student, parent, or member of the
 public can use to report sexual misconduct incidents, anonymously if they wish, to
 OSP.




2019-2020 Data Summary: 9/3/19 to 1/31/20




Case Volume Remains Higher than Last Year

Cases by Type of Incident through First Semester of School Year






Student Misconduct Accounts for Majority of SY20 Reports






Student Allegation Types from 9/3/19 – 1/31/20

Student Misconduct






Reports of Adult Misconduct






Adult Allegation Types from 9/3/19 – 1/31/20
