






Learner Model Preferences: Overall






Learner Model Preferences: Overall by Race/Ethnicity






Learner Model Preferences: High School by Race/Ethnicity






Learner Model Preferences: Overall by Priority Groups

High School Reopening



Ongoing High School Task Force Discussions with CTU

- While parties have not reached an agreement, task force discussions have been productive so far
- April 19, the first day of the fourth quarter, is the target date for students to return to classrooms
- A return to high school classrooms must be available to all students—with their assigned teachers
- Instructional models will vary between schools due to enrollment and capacity for social distancing
- Scheduling Framework shared with schools to allow for planning on individual school structures, utilizing models developed with the Task Force
- Discussions of a hybrid structure would provide in-person instruction at least two days per week





Proposed Framework for HS Schedules

- Proposed framework seeks to optimize and balance instruction and safety
- Overview of Framework
 - \rightarrow Start with school enrollment
 - \rightarrow Review student opt-in data
 - \rightarrow Assess space availability for social distancing
 - \rightarrow Determine model most schools on a 2-1-2 hybrid structure
- Assumes schedules are minimally changed
 - → Schools must maintain current schedules; the deciding factor is how many students they can bring back within those schedules based on how many opt-in
 - → Schools will determine the appropriate model based on the parameters set in the framework based on: 1. School size, 2. Number of students opting in and 3. Utilization rates



Proposed Framework (DETAILED)

There are 3 variables for determining HS model...

Students Enrolled

- "Small" (250 or fewer)
- "Medium" (251-1000)
- "Large" (More than 1000)

% Student Opt In

- Fewer than 67% Opt In
- More than 67% Opt In

Physical capacity of school for social distancing

- Adequate space in classroom
- Limited space in classroom

... which will result in one of three school models


- Student Strategic Advisory Team (SSAT)

New High School Learning Hub Locations

- Three new locations opened this month
 - Richards Career Academy HS 60 students (CBO-managed)
 - George H. Corliss HS 60 students (CBO-managed)
 - William H. Wells Community Academy HS -School managed - 50 students (school-managed)
- Students enrolled at these high schools are eligible to enroll
- Schools are launching their own Learning Hubs using school staff and OST partners







Social Emotional Learning



Multi-tiered System of SEL

- Establishing Behavior Health Teams
 - 205 schools are implementing a behavior health team
- Ensuring schools have a menu of interventions available to students
 - **218 schools** have a menu of 3 or more OSEL-supported small group services
 - 31 schools do not have any OSEL interventions





SY21 Staff Training Update

- Trained over 1,000 staff in addressing trauma, social skills, anger, and depression as part of the Healing Centered Project
 - 775 staff trained in the Rainbows (grief)/Silver Linings (trauma) curricula
 - 88% of schools have at least one staff member trained in a Tier II trauma intervention
 - 20 schools trained in Act & Adapt a group program, in partnership with DePaul University, designed to prevent and treat depression





School Partnerships with Community-based Organizations

- 232 schools have at least one SEL/mental health partnership agreement on record
- **8,929 students** are receiving virtual supports from 22 vendors providing intensive mentoring and mental health services

- COVID-19 Staff Vaccination Survey collects information on vaccine status and sentiment to inform planning efforts (per interim Board Rule 6-4)
- Survey data and staff link to schedule appointments at CPS vaccination centers available at <u>cps.edu/vaccinations</u>
- The Chicago Department of Public Health identified a new vaccination vendor for our vaccination centers this week.
- CPS vaccinations scheduled for today at Roosevelt HS will be rescheduled.
- All other vaccinations appointments will proceed as scheduled at CPS Vaccination Centers.

Survey Data

Opt-in Process

- CPS and CTU joint task force meeting twice weekly since March 3 to address high school reopening
- Goals for reopening high schools
 - Phased approach for in-person instruction in Quarter 4
 - End-of-year and summer engagement with students (graduation, summer academic programming)
 - Smooth and successful reopening this fall
- The district sent an opt-in form for Quarter 4 in-person learning to all high school parents; the deadline to complete was yesterday March 23 at 11:59 p.m.





Protect Chicago Plus

- Ensures vaccine reaches the individuals and communities most impacted by COVID-19
- 8-week vaccination clinic at Steinmetz High School vaccinates 2,000 Belmont-Cragin residents each weekend
 - This clinic is now distributing second doses to residents of Belmont-Cragin!
- Planning community vaccination events at other high schools in Protect Chicago Plus neighborhoods
 - To support these partnerships, the district has shared a guidance document to all CPS principals





Joint High School Task Force w/ CTU

- CPS-CTU HS Task Force is meeting twice per week, with Facilitator Rosa Tiscareno joining discussions
 - Parties are utilizing interest based bargaining, a more collaborative process, for these negotiations.
- Discussions have centered on these topics so far:
 - Goal to target Fourth Quarter for high school return
 - Providing access to in-person learning to all students interested in returning to school onsite
 - Hybrid schedules and structures for in-person learning, including considerations of block, 4-by-4, and traditional 7/8 class schedules under a hybrid model
 - Timeline and process for gathering data from students and staff to inform planning
 - Student and staff safety upon return to in-person learning
 - Staffing considerations
