



By Race/Ethnicity







Students that selected "Learn at School" broken out by race/ethnicity and economically disadvantaged status






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Q2 Student Attendance and Engagement



Broken out by Category






This metric represents the district attendance rate from July 1st through February 5th, the end of week 20 of the second quarter, and includes charter/contract/options schools and PE/PK students.

The drop in attendance was most notable in our African American students who saw a 4.5 percentage point drop.



Broken out by Priority Group


All priority groups of students saw bigger drops in attendance compared to the district overall, with the exception of English Learners.

All grade levels saw declines in attendance relative to last year, though the biggest drops in attendance were observed in the high school grade levels.






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Q2 YTD Average Google Activity Rate: District, ES, HS

Average Google Activity Rates for both ES and HS were similar to the District overall average, however the HS rate was 0.3 percentage points higher than ES.






This metric represents the percentage of PE, PK, and K-12 CPS students who have joined a Google learning session on each weekday that they were enrolled at a CPS district-managed school in the first twenty weeks (Sept 8, 2020 - Feb 5, 2021). The data excludes days of non-attendance (Sept 7, Oct 12, Nov 3, Nov 6, Nov 25-27, Dec 19-Jan 2, Jan 18, Feb 5, weekends).

Q2 YTD Average Google Activity Rate: Broken out by Race/Ethnicity

African American students have the lowest Google Activity Rate at 3.4 percentage points below the district average, where Asian students exceed the district average by 3.7 percentage points.






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Q2 YTD Average Google Activity Rate: Broken out by Priority Groups

The Google Activity Rate for STLS students is 8.4 percentage points below the district average.






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Q2 YTD Average Google Activity Rate: Broken out by Grade Level

Students in 2nd grade and under have Google Activity Rates below the district average with a range of 0.4-18 percentage point difference.






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
Elementary School: Q2 Grades Overview in Core Courses







Elementary School: Racial Breakdown for Q2 Grades in Reading






Elementary School: Racial Breakdown for Q2 Grades in Math



Elementary School: Q2 Grades by Priority Groups (IEP, EL, STLS)








High School: Q2 Grades Overview in Core Courses






High School Q2 Grades: Racial Breakdown for Reading


High School Q2 Grades: Racial Breakdown for Math



Vaccinations

• Through a partnership with Walgreens and the Chicago Department of Public Health, 2,000 pre-k and cluster staff and staff with medically vulnerable household members were offered vaccinations.





Pausing In-Person Learning

- Under the agreement, the district will revert to online learning for at least 14 calendar days if the city's COVID-19 test positivity rate (7-day rolling average) meets the following criteria:
 - Rate increases for 7 consecutive days:
 - Rate for each of the 7 consecutive days is at least 15% higher than the rate one week prior; and
 - Rate on the seventh day is 10% or greater.
- CPS will resume in-person learning after 14 days or when positivity rate falls below the criteria above.





Telework accommodations

- Staff with medical risks or primary caregiver for relatives with medical risks
- Household member accommodations
- Childcare
- Other employees





Joint Task Forces

- Health & Safety Committees
 - Parties established new COVID-19 health and safety committees in a two-tiered system, with district-level and building-level committees
 - District-level committee will develop a checklist for school-level committees to utilize and review system-wide concerns as well as issues escalated from the school-level committees
 - Parties met for the first district-level committee last week
- High School Task Force
 - CPS and CTU will form a joint task force to address high school reopening issues
 - Expect to convene the first committee meeting this week



Additional Terms of the Tentative Agreement

- **Health and Safety Protocols-** Agreed to terms on health screenings and temperature checks, cleaning supplies, PPE/CFCs.
- **Ventilation-** Confirmed adherence to ASHRAE guidelines, providing HEPA filters and portable air quality monitors for each school.
- **COVID-19 Testing-** Parties agreed to surveillance testing, testing for students, post operational pause testing.
- **Contact Tracing-** CPS to maintain sufficient staff to complete the case investigation process.
- **Remote Learning-** CPS will provide additional technology and support to families for remote learning.
- **Hybrid Learning-** Specials teachers shall not exceed cohort limitations in the Principal Handbook.
- School Community Support- CPS and CTU shall collaborate on additional supports for STLS students.

- Remote work for Special Education Classroom Assistants (SECAs)
- Reporting for bus aides, parent workers, and bus monitors
- Accommodations
- Food distribution support in the event of a work stoppage






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School Readiness Metrics Publicly Available for Families at cps.edu/schoolreadiness

- To ensure CPS is prepared for the safe return of students and staff, we are collecting and sharing data on school readiness for reopening
- Data is updated on a regular basis with information about facilities, delivery of devices, HEPA air filters, face coverings, hand sanitizer, and other materials to support the health and wellness of our school community






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High School Reopening Update

- We are opening 3 new High School Learning Hub locations in March:
 - Richards Career Academy HS 60 students
 - George H. Corliss HS 60 students
 - William H. Wells Community Academy HS School managed - 50 students
- Community-Based Organizations will staff and manage the Hub at these schools
- Only students enrolled at these high schools will be eligible to enroll at these Hubs
- In addition to these Hubs, we have given schools the flexibility to use the OST partners to support remote learning supervision
- Joint task force with CTU is being created to explore reopening options





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Continued Stakeholder Engagement

- Direct Outreach:
 - Over 25,000 families called to discuss their child(ren)'s learning preferences
 - Called over 50,000 families eligible for Chicago Connected, to help get them connected to the internet
- **Parent round tables:** hosted two parent round tables to discuss reopening with families
- **Parent stories:** FACE has identified parents willing to share their stories in a public way





Continued Stakeholder Engagement

- Ask the Expert Series has engaged parents, partners and community members and leveraged 15 subject matter experts to take direct questions from the public
- LSC Engagement: LSCs each received a Wave 1 readiness to open letter. Additionally, once the district's readiness to open dashboard went live, links were shared. And, the LSC new member kick off took place on February 4th, we had Dr. Fox and CDPH as guests
- Continued CAC engagement: biweekly CAC chair meetings
- Continued Faith Leaders Engagement: biweekly Faith Leaders meeting





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Vaccine Distribution Update

- Provided COVID-19 vaccination opportunities to more than 14,000 CPS employees
- Developed COVID-19 Vaccination Survey to collect information on vaccine status and sentiment to inform planning efforts
- Launched a new webpage <u>cps.edu/vaccinations</u> and added to the Reopening site to share updates on districts work to distribute the COVID-19 vaccine

As of February 23, 2021 CPS has offered vaccination opportunities to employees

CPS Vaccination Sites Opened Feb. 15

- Vaccination sites will allow us to provide vaccination first-doses to 1,500 CPS employees per week out of the City's limited supply
 - Michele Clark High School (West)
 - Clemente High School (Central)
 - Roosevelt High School (North)
 - Chicago Vocational Career Academy (South)





Protect Chicago Plus

- Protect Chicago Plus is a targeted vaccine distribution program designed to ensure vaccine reaches the individuals and communities most impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic
- Steinmetz High School is hosting an 8-week vaccination clinic for 2,000 Belmont-Cragin residents per weekend
- Planning additional community vaccination events at other high schools in Protect Chicago Plus neighborhoods





Next Steps for Vaccination Distribution

- Create and share additional opportunities for COVID-19 vaccination for CPS employees via CDPH and our health systems partners as more doses become available
- Utilize school-based health centers and public health authorities to educate staff, students, families and communities about COVID-19 vaccination, address vaccine hesitancy, and build trust



- Be an example in modeling safe, responsible behaviors










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

Elementary School: Q2 Grades Overview in Core Courses








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
Elementary School: Racial Breakdown for Q2 Grades in Science

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
Elementary School: Racial Breakdown for Q2 Grades in Social Science










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
High School Q2 Grades: Racial Breakdown for Science


